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(i) Introduction

PURPOSE

Also, this plan aims to develop a long-term strategy for the growth and development of the Banana Shire. METHODOLOGY

The Banana Shire Council has identified that a "Place Based" Community Plan is required in each of the Shire's twelve towns. This will allow us to develop a positive trend regarding population growth as well as fulfilling the potential of the individual community's economic and social future.



HISTORY

Jambin (Aboriginal for Echidna) was originally set up as a supply depot for the railways. It now forms an intricate part of the rich agricultural area.

DESCRIPTION

Jambin is located on the Burnett Highway just north of Biloela. It boasts a small, tight knit community and is the centre for a variety of agriculture businesses and industry. Jambin maintains a popular rest stop for travellers and a variety of other services and facilities.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF KEY CENSUS RESULTS

In the 2011 Census there were 308 persons usually resident in the area around Jambin which includes the Smoky Creek area, 165 males and 143 females an increase of 3% from 2006.

COMMUNITY IDENTITY & VISION

Vision for Jambin

Jambin, home of the echidna, is a friendly and supportive residential community that encourages the promotion and development of its rural industries, school, post office, and hotel and embraces its past and looks towards a progressive future.

COMMUNITY PLAN

As a small community, the School, Cemetery, Hall, Recreation Grounds and Hotel are very important to residents. The continued upgrade of the Community Hall Recreation Reserve and Cemetery have been identified as priorities.

Roads

Local roads host a variety of concerns for residents of Jambin. However, by taking a number of steps, many of these concerns can be addressed. Suggested steps are:

- Continue to improve school bus routes
- Change the speed limit to 60km per hour through Jambin
- Improve signage for the School including a marker indicating the distance to Jambin to assist travellers
- Remove stop signs from disused rail lines
- Install signals or boom gates at the Earlsfield Rail crossing

The condition of the roads around Jambin is an issue and potential solutions and actions are as follows:

- Local traffic only sign on Cahills Lane
- Upgrade the Jambin to School section of the Highway
- Address the ponding of water on roads such as the Jambin-Dakenba Road
- Install depth gauges on Kroombit Creek to act as flood warnings
- Construct a dual lane bridge across Callide Creek at Jambin
- Bus turnaround on the intersection of Fiveways Mt Eugene Road & Wilsons Lane

- Upgrade the Burnett Highway & Jambin Goovigen Road intersection
- Erect school bus signs on Smoky and Bells Creek Roads
- Erect a "Low Gear" sign on Johnson Parry Road

The increased traffic in the area by heavy vehicles and freight trucks is affecting the condition of the roads. Solutions to be considered include:

- Construction of a slip lane at the Goovigen intersection to cater for Teys Brothers trucks and grain haulage.
- Jambin-Goovigen Road needs to be widened and culverts upgraded

Tourism

While the issue of tourism is not a large one in Jambin, there are a variety of steps that can be taken to make the most of tourists such as:

- Encourage people passing through to stop, as they are more likely to use the hotel when doing so
- Encourage tourism using signage at the rest stop that indicates local attractions and services as well as emergency contacts for the area
- Relocating the rest stop sign on the highway to give people more warning would help improve the number of people using the facilities
- Upgrading the local caravan parking would make the area more attractive to tourists

Flood Mitigation

Flooding is a major issue within Jambin and district. The management of the Callide Dam has a major impact on the community. Improved management practices from SunWater are vital.

Rural Industries

Due to the inevitable closure of the mines in the Banana Shire within the next few generations, the rural industries of the area become the most viable industries for the future.

Beef, dairy and local irrigated and dry land agriculture are the largest industries in the area. Their growth needs to be supported and encouraged. An example of this is ensuring reliable water for the needs of Teys Brothers.
